Background

- a. Cosumnes Subbasin GSA Member Contribution Agreement
 - In February 2023 the CGA Board of Directors approved a Member Contribution Agreement. This agreement authorizes payment of FY 22-23 Member Contributions.
 - Our FY 22-23 Member Contributions will be paid in two payments. The first invoice is provided here. The second invoice will come after the County collects the remaining groundwater sustainability fee payments.
- b. Fee Study Next Steps
 - An update on the Cosumnes Subbasin Funding Study Development will be provided by CGA reps and SRCD Staff.
- c. Staff Services Contract Discussion
 - The CGA Board has been discussing staff support needs. Additional support is likely needed.

Staff Recommendations

Adopt the CGA Member Contribution Agreement and authorize the payment of the CGA invoice.

This Member Contribution Agreement ("Agreement") is entered into by and between the seven Groundwater Sustainability Agencies (GSAs) of the Cosumnes Subbasin, which are: Amador County Groundwater Management Authority ("Amador"), City of Galt ("City"), Clay Water District ("Clay"), Sacramento County Groundwater Sustainability Agency ("County"), Galt Irrigation District ("Ga1t ID"), Omochumne-Hartnell Water District ("OHWD"), and Sloughhouse Resource Conservation District ("Sloughhouse RCD"), each of which is a "Party" to or a "Member" of this Agreement.. Each of the parties to this Agreement shall individually be referred to as the "Party," or collectively, as the "Parties." This Agreement is effective as of the date the last Party signs the Agreement.

RECITALS:

WHEREAS, The Parties entered into and duly adopted a Framework Agreement in 2017 under which the Parties agreed to submit the Cosumnes Subbasin Groundwater Sustainability Plan (GSP) to the California Department of Water Resources (DWR) no later than January 31, 2022, which is the deadline for submission under the Sustainable Groundwater Management Act (SGMA). Following GSP submission, the Parties will begin implementation of the GSP; provided, that the governing boards of each Party approve the GSP, and

WHEREAS, the Parties entered into a Joint Exercise of Powers Agreement to form the Cosumnes Groundwater Authority (CGA), a Joint Powers Authority (JPA), on the last date a Party signed the JPA, and

WHEREAS, the Parties now desire to enter into this Agreement to support the joint exercise of powers agreement ("Joint Powers Agreement") establishing the CGA as a JPA in order to achieve the goals as identified in JPA Recital E, for implementing the GSP in the Cosumnes Subbasin; and

¹The County of Sacramento and Sacramento County Water Agency combined constitute Sacramento County Groundwater Sustainability Agency and together will be treated as a single party to this agreement.

WHEREAS, the Parties have or intend to individually or collectively assess fees on irrigated acres, or contribute an agreed upon amount related to the amount of groundwater pumped in their respective jurisdictional boundaries, to generate estimated revenue in the amount of FOUR HUNDRED TWENTY-FIVE THOUSAND, SEVEN-HUNDRED THIRTY DOLLARS (\$425,730) for Fiscal Year 2022-2023, and

WHEREAS, the estimated cost per Party for CGA related work is included in Exhibit 1 (Cosumnes Groundwater Authority Fiscal Year 2022-2023 Estimated Expenses), which also itemizes other estimated costs for the next year of GSP implementation.

NOW, THEREFORE, the Parties, on the terms and conditions herein set forth, hereby agree as follows:

TERMS:

- 1. Subject to the direction and prior approval of the Parties through the CGA JPA, the Authority, or designated GSA, shall execute an agreement or agreements with one or more Consultants to conduct the activities as listed in, but not limited to, Exhibit 1, pursuant to the terms below.
- 2. The Parties shall each pay their proportionate share of the estimated First Year GSP Implementation Costs for their GSA, as delineated in Exhibit 2 hereto ("Fiscal Year 2022-2023 Member Contributions"). The total amount described in Exhibit 2 shall be considered the JPA Budget for Fiscal Year 2022-2023, per Section 5.1 of the JPA Agreement.
- 3. Should the fees generated by individual GSAs assessments for Fiscal Year 2022-23 fall short of the anticipated amount, then that GSA's Member Contribution (as reflected in Exhibit 2) and the total budget shall be reduced to match the revenue received, or otherwise identified by JPA.

- 4. A Party, or other entity, may contribute funding to compensate for any budget shortages.
- 5. Should the Fiscal Year 2022-2023 Member Contribution funds collected by the JPA Treasurer from the GSA Members be less than anticipated then the overall budget will be reduced to match the revenue received.
- 6. In the event that any additional entity becomes a Party to the JPA or this Agreement, or contributes money for GSP implementation, JPA Section 4.2(1) shall govern the amount of the new Party's contribution and the proportionate decrease and refund of the other Parties' respective contributions, if any, or specify what JPA activities the new Party's contribution will fund in addition to what has been funded by the existing Fiscal Year 2022-2023 Member Contributions.
- 7. The JPA's retention of consultants under this Agreement is contingent and expressly dependent on the condition precedent that the CGA JPA receives the full amount of Fiscal Year 2022-2023 Member Contributions from each GSA. If the CGA JPA does not receive the full amount of Fiscal Year 2022-2023 Member Contributions identified in Exhibit 2, the contributing Parties may seek a reduction in the overall budget identified in Exhibit 1.
- 8. Each Party shall make payment of its Fiscal Year 2022-2023 Member Contribution to the CGA as identified in Exhibit 2 by either: (1) two installment payments totaling the amount of the total Fiscal Year 2022-2023 Member Contribution for such GSA, with the first payment due within 30 days of receiving fees collected from the first distribution of the direct levy on Sacramento County tax rolls and the second payment due within 30 days of receiving fees collected from the second distribution of the direct levy on Sacramento County tax rolls or, (2) full payment of the

Fiscal Year 2022-2023 Member Contribution within 30 days of receiving fees collected from the first distribution of the direct levy on Sacramento County tax rolls and.

- 9. In-kind contributions are appropriate and recognized as satisfactory to meet the cost share requirements of a Party. Any in-kind contributions proposed to be substituted, in whole or in part, for monetary payment of a Party's Fiscal Year 2022-2023 Member Contribution must be part of the fiscal year 2022-2023 approved budget and approved in advance by the CGA Board of Directors.
- 10. GSP implementation expenses accrued by a Party before the adoption of this

 Agreement are appropriate and recognized as creditable towards that Party's Fiscal Year 2022-2023

 Member Contribution requirement. Any previously accrued expenses, e.g. monitoring costs from
 2021, proposed to be credited or substituted for all or part of a Party's 2022-2023 Member

 Contribution must be part of the fiscal year 2022-2023 approved budget and approved by the CGA

 Board of Directors.
- 11. In the event that the actual costs are less than the TOTAL estimated cost set forth in Exhibit 1, the remaining funds held by the JPA shall be refunded to each GSA based on their proportional share of Fiscal Year 2022-2023 Member Contributions, or placed in reserve, as determined by the CGA Board of Directors.
- 12. Reserves, defined as any excess funds in fiscal year 22-23, or any funds from costs being less than JPA Member Contributions, may be used to fund an amendment, or successor agreement, to this Agreement, or refunded to GSAs, as determined by the CGA Board of Directors.
 - 13. To the extent there is any conflict between the terms of this Agreement and the JPA the JPA shall control.

Background

The California Department of Conservation (DOC) announced on February 1, 2023 the release of the Round (FY 22/23) Multibenefit Land Repurposing Program Guidelines and Solicitation Notice. Applications for the grant program are being accepted through March 29, 2023.

The California Association of Resource Conservation Districts (CARCD) has been leading an application development effort for over a year which has garnered wide support within the South American and Cosumnes Subbasins, and beyond. Due to a variety of unforeseen circumstances, a locally led application may be a more appropriate approach than before. With the support of CARCD Staff, Sloughhouse RCD Staff have begun developing a Sloughhouse RCD led application.

Resolution of the Board of Directors of the Sloughhouse Resource Conservation
District Authorizing the Submittal and Execution of an Application to the
California Department of Conservation's Multibenefit Land Repurposing
Program

WHEREAS, the Sloughhouse Resource Conservation District ("District") is dedicated to supporting our constituents in becoming better stewards of our natural resources through education, outreach, and implementing conservation projects to advance the long-term sustainability of working landscapes, rural life, and our unique environment; and,

WHEREAS, the District manages natural resources through collaboration with stakeholders and partners in their district to successfully balance the wide range of programs that protect groundwater for long-term sustainability, soil for agricultural productivity and environmental values, surface water for multiple uses including agriculture, fish and wildlife, and natural areas for their habitat value; and,

WHEREAS, The District is a Groundwater Sustainability Agency (GSA) over part of its jurisdiction in the Cosumnes and South American Subbasins under the provisions of the Sustainable Groundwater Management Act (SGMA) and the Board of Directors (Board) of the District also concurrently functions as the Sloughhouse Resource Conservation District GSA; and,

WHEREAS, the Cosumnes Subbasin Groundwater Sustainability Plan identifies land repurposing as a strategy for addressing the Subbasin's historic and continued groundwater overdraft along with recharge and other multibenefical projects and management actions; and,

WHEREAS, the South American Groundwater Sustainability Plan acknowledges that 5-10% water use conservation would greatly support groundwater conditions.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Directors of the Sloughhouse Resource Conservation District as follows:

- The Board authorizes the District Manager to submit a grant application for a 2022 California Department of Conservation Multibenefit Land Repurposing Program grant.
- 2. The Board authorizes entrance into a grant agreement with the California Department of Conservation for the project and accept the template terms and conditions, if the project is awarded funding.
- 3. The Board authorizes the District Manager, as agent, accept the award of grant funding and to execute tasks, such as signing documents, related to the application, grant agreement, reimbursement requests, if the project is awarded funding.

This Resolution shall be effective immediately upon its approval and adoption.

Subbasin Descriptions

South American (SoAm) Subbasin

 The SoAm Subbasin GSP, submitted in January 2022, concluded that the SoAm Subbasin can maintain sustainable groundwater conditions with the projects and management actions (namely recharge type projects) already in place/in development.

Cosumnes (Co) Subbasin

 The Co Subbasin GSP, also submitted in January 2022, concluded that the Cosumnes Subbasin will need intervention by GSAs and local partners to avoid undesirable results. Demand management (ex: multibenefit land repurposing) and supply augmentation (ex: recharge) will both be utilized.

Proposal Summary

We seek to employ agricultural lands in multibenefit solutions while keeping them *maximally productive in new, integrated* ways by exploring the following tools:

- 1. managed aquifer recharge (MAR)
- 2. habitat restoration (e.g. farm edge planting)
- 3. regenerative agriculture/soil health practices
- 4. solar installation on land to be fallowed, or within productive acreage ("agrivoltaics")
- 5. projects that benefit regional flood control, water supply, and water quality

None of the proposed activities are focused on permanent fallowing of productive agricultural land. Rather, we will seek to incorporate ag land as a part of the solution to groundwater and other related crises impacting fertility and viability of ag operations in the Sacramento County area.

Approach

Slightly less than \$3M for "capacity", e.g. education, outreach, and Plan development

 Material costs and staff time in developing, launching, and maintaining multibenefit demonstration sites; travel to existing or proposed multibenefit demonstration sites; educational materials for landowners, producers and community members; staff time (existing or new staff) and partner paid time for outreach; media, events and mailers/digital ads; and org staff time in reviewing, presenting about, and iterating on their local multibenefit land repurposing projects

\$6M for "taking action", e.g. project development, permitting, implementation, and monitoring:

 Staff and Consultant time for technical assistance, project scoping, implementation, and monitoring; supplemental environmental review; permitting costs; consultant costs; and contractor costs.

To address upcoming workloads, it is recommended to move the Administrative Coordinator role from approximately .5 FTE to 1 FTE for the remainder of the fiscal year. Upcoming activities anticipated to require additional staff support include:

- Contracting with CA Dept. of Food and Agriculture (CDFA) for our successful Conservation Agriculture Planning Grant Program application.
- Finalizing FY 2021 and 2022 financial audits.
- Development of a 2023-2023 annual work plan and budget.
- Development and submission of CA Dept. of Conservation (DOC) Multibenefit Land Repurposing Program application and CDFA Water Efficiency Technical Assistance grant application.
- Supporting outreach efforts such as social media, website improvements, and events such as Earth Day and other community events.
- Successfully apply for the California Special District Leadership Foundation's District Transparency Certificate of Excellence.
- Ongoing support of long-term project/partnership coordination.

To sustain funding support for the Administrative Coordinator position, the following funding opportunities are being pursued:
